Dear Senator Newman:

The Stanislaus Regional Water Authority (SRWA) is writing to express our support of SB 991 (Newman), which will allow local water agencies to have the option to deliver projects using a progressive design-build (PDB) method. SB 991 will allow public agencies to use, for specific projects, PDB which has grown in popularity in recent years as a valuable form of collaborative project development that can provide multiple benefits when used to execute complex public works projects.

SRWA was formed as a Joint Powers Authority in 2015, between the Cities of Turlock and Ceres to plan, finance, deliver, and operate the Regional Surface Water Supply Project (Project). The Project was authorized in Public Contract Code 22161 to use design-build that integrates design and construction procured from a single entity, saving significant time and money to the SRWA. Future Project phases, procured through PDB, could result in even more substantial cost and schedule benefits to the Authority and ultimately the Cities' rate payers.

PDB is a project delivery method that allows the PDB team to perform design, construction engineering, project management, and construction according to design parameters, performance criteria, and other requirements established by the public agency owner. PDB delivery benefits the public agency owner by providing the opportunity to add the design-build team to the overall project team early in the design phase affording the public agency owner and the design build team more opportunities to collaborate during the project's design phase. Early collaboration is key to reducing project risk, cost, and schedule.

California is in another cycle of drought. Our economy and citizens depend on the reliable supply of water to remain globally competitive. SB 991 will allow the delivery of projects that treat water, recycle water, or produce advanced treated water to be efficiently and effectively streamlined. SB 991 will make PDB just "another tool in the toolbox" that public agency owners can use to deliver projects. SB 991 could assist local agencies in addressing the state's critical need for additional water.

For all these reasons, the SRWA supports SB 991.

1. ACTION RECOMMENDED:

Motion: Directing the General Manager to sign a Memorandum of

Understanding with Stanislaus County for County Participation in Pavement Restoration of Fox Road and

Berkeley Road.

2. DISCUSSION OF ISSUE:

Finished water pipelines to serve the cities from the Regional Water Treatment Plant were installed within existing or by-usage County Road rights-of-way pursuant to the County's statutory franchise right (Public Utilities Code section 10101) and Encroachment Permit ENCR 190-2021 to CH2MHill Engineers, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Jacobs, dated April 20, 2021.

For some roadway segments, the County has asked SRWA to provide a 2" grind and overlay (road resurfacing) of the adjacent lane in lieu of patch repairs of SRWA damaged areas. This approach would result in a uniform full existing-width roadway of consistent surface treatment thereby providing a smoother overall travel way.

The County would like to take advantage of the presence of SRWA's Design Build contractor (Jacobs) and its road reconstruction/repair equipment, materials, and economies of scale for the road resurfacing work.

SRWA and the County have evaluated and discussed the terms of the encroachment permit, the pipeline installation-related impacts to the affected County roads, and the County's request for road resurfacing of adjacent roadway segments. The parties therefore have prepared a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to confirm and memorialize the scope of SRWA's road reconstruction and repair obligations under the encroachment permit and the terms of County participation in the adjacent lane road resurfacing work. The MOU will be incorporated as part of the encroachment permit.

SRWA has established the cost to perform County requested road resurfacing work in the amount of \$987,951. Additional costs will include traffic control and subcontractor and contractor mark-ups.

SRWA will contribute the equivalent of 2 feet of road resurfacing for the entire length of roadway segments on Fox and Berkeley Rds., or 17.25% of the total cost calculated to be \$170,422. County's contribution would be \$817,529. Additional costs will be distributed at the same percentages.

3. FISCAL IMPACT / BUDGET AMENDMENT:

The Design Build contract includes an allowance item for SRWA-damaged adjacent lane repair in the amount of \$3,628,624. SRWA's contribution to this road resurfacing work will be drawn from the allowance, therefore no budget

amendment is required. Unspent allowance dollars will be a credit to the overall project budget.

County's contribution will be paid to SRWA, which in turn, will compensate Jacobs for the completed work.

4. GENERAL MANAGER'S COMMENTS:

Recommends approval.

5. ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION:

6. ALTERNATIVES:

The Board could choose to not enter into this MOU and be obligated to compensate Jacobs for the entire cost of pavement restoration.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING REGARDING COUNTY OF STANISLAUS/SRWA COUNTY ROAD ENCROACHMENT PERMIT

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING Regarding County of Stanislaus/SRWA County Road Encroachment Permit ("MOU") is made as of ________, 2022, between Stanislaus Regional Water Authority ("SRWA") and County of Stanislaus ("County"), and is made with reference to the following facts:

- A. SRWA is a joint powers authority created by the Cities of Ceres and Turlock to develop the Regional Surface Water Supply Project that will provide treated surface water to those Cities. SRWA has constructed, among other infrastructure, water transmission pipelines to convey treated water from a new water treatment plant to each City. SRWA's pipeline are located within existing County Road rights-of-way or County Roads located in non-dedicated alignments pursuant to its statutory franchise right (Public Utilities Code section 10101) or pursuant to Encroachment Permit ENCR 190-2021 issued to CH2MHill Engineers, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Jacobs Engineering Group Inc., on April 20, 2021, attached hereto as Exhibit A and made a part hereof ("Encroachment Permit").
- B. Currently SRWA has contracted for the installation of a pipeline in the roadways shown in the Encroachment Permit. In connection with the pipeline installation, SRWA's contractor (or contractor's subcontractor) will perform the road reconstruction and repair work required by the encroachment permit.
- C. For the entire length of the roadway segments on Fox and Berkeley Roads installation (shown on <u>Exhibit B</u> attached hereto and made a part hereof), the County would like to take advantage of SRWA's pipeline-related road reconstruction efforts to economically provide a 2" grind and overlay of the entire width of the adjacent lane road segment.
- D. The installation of the SRWA pipeline will cause damage to the adjacent opposing lane of the roadway for which SRWA will be responsible for repairing. In lieu of such repair and in connection with County's desire to resurface the entire width of the adjacent roadway lane as described above, SRWA has agreed to contribute the cost of labor and materials to resurface the equivalent of 2 feet of the adjacent lane road segment.
- E. As set forth in that certain letter from Jacobs Engineering Group dated May 6, 2022 (attached hereto as Exhibit C and made a part hereof), the total cost to perform County requested road resurfacing is estimated to be Nine Hundred Eighty-Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty One Dollars (\$987,951) constituting the ("Total Resurfacing Cost") based on a unit cost of \$29.73 per square yard for the 2" grind and overlay, and is based on the May 4, 2022, California Statewide Crude Oil Price Index of 596.7.
- F. SRWA's contribution of 2 feet of road resurfacing in lieu of its repair obligations has been calculated to be 17.25% of the above total cost ("SRWA Cost Percentage"), leaving the County's contribution to be 82.75% ("County Cost Percentage"). Additional costs (e.g., traffic control, subcontractor and contractor mark-ups and price increases) will be allocated to each party at their respective percentage.
- G. SRWA's contractor has made a Road Closure Fee deposit with the County to which the County shall credit against its reimbursement obligations under this MOU ("County's Road Closure Credit").

H. The parties have prepared this MOU to confirm and memorialize the scope of SRWA's road reconstruction and repair obligations under the encroachment permit and the terms of County participation in the adjacent lane road resurfacing work.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing, and of the mutual promises contained herein, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- **1. Incorporation of Recitals.** The Recitals in Paragraphs A through H above are hereby incorporated as if set forth herein.
- **2. Adjacent Lane Resurfacing.** SRWA shall provide road resurfacing of those certain roadway segments of Fox and Berkeley Roads as shown on Exhibit B adjacent to SRWA's road restoration work.
 - 2.1 The County understands that the road resurfacing work is not a structural repair and, therefore, will not prohibit alligator cracking from occurring in the future. The 2" grind and overlay does not include a warranty of the roadway or for new pavement failures due to existing failed subgrades.
 - 2.2 County's reimbursement obligation under this MOU shall be the product of the Total Resurfacing Cost multiplied by the County Cost Percentage ("County's Reimbursement Obligation").
 - 2.3 SRWA shall prepare and submit to the County a request for reimbursement of road resurfacing costs, up to the amount shown in 2.2 above, subject to adjustment for final traffic control costs, subcontractor and contractor mark-ups, and price increases) and will include a copy of the contractor requisition(s).
 - 2.4 County's Reimbursement Obligation shall be satisfied first from County's Road Closure Credit.
 - 2.5 In the event that the Road Closure Credit exceeds the initial estimate of County's Reimbursement Obligation (in the amount of \$817,529, as adjusted by the inclusion of any above-mentioned additional costs), but is less than County's Road Closure Credit, then the obligation of SRWA for payment of the Road Closure Credit shall nonetheless be deemed to be fully discharged.
 - 2.6 If County's Reimbursement Obligation exceeds the County's Road Closure Credit, then County shall pay any excess amount to SRWA within sixty (60) days.
- 3. Indemnity. SRWA shall hold County, its agents, officers, officials, and employees harmless from and save, defend and indemnify against them any and all claims, losses, liabilities and damages from every cause, including but not limited to injury to person or property or wrongful death or any legal challenges arising out of whether the County has dedicated rights of way along the alignments of the project or whether the County has the authority to allow SRWA pipelines to be placed in the aforementioned alignments, with the indemnity to include reasonable attorney's fees, and all costs and expenses, arising out of, resulting from, or in connection with any work delegated to or action taken or omitted to be taken by SRWA, its agents, officers, officials or employees, except to the extent that the act or omission arises from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of County, its agents, officers, officials, or employees relating to or during the performance of its obligations under this MOU.

4. General Provisions

- 4.1. Entire Contract. The parties intend this MOU to be the sole, final, complete, exclusive, and integrated expression, and statement of the terms of their agreement concerning the subject matter of this MOU. This MOU supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations, contracts, or other documents that may be related to the subject matter of this MOU, except those other documents that may be expressly referenced in this MOU. This MOU is intended to be used in conjunction with the Encroachment Permit subject to the order of precedence set forth in the following section.
- 4.2. <u>Order of Precedence</u>. If there is any inconsistency between the encroachment permitting documents, the following order of precedence shall apply:
 - 4.1.1 Encroachment Permit
 - 4.1.2 This MOU
 - 4.1.3 Table 1 Proposed Road Restoration for SRWA Regional Water Supply Project (attached hereto as Exhibit D and made a part hereof)
- 4.3. <u>Construction and Interpretation</u>. The parties agree and acknowledge that this MOU has been arrived at through negotiation, and that each party has had a full and fair opportunity to revise the terms of this MOU. Consequently, the normal rule of construction that any ambiguities are to be resolved against the drafting party will not apply in construing or interpreting this MOU.
- 4.4. <u>Assignment</u>. This MOU and all rights and obligations under it are personal to the parties. The MOU may not be transferred, assigned, delegated, or subcontracted in whole or in part, whether by assignment, subcontract, merger, operation of law or otherwise, by either party without the prior written consent of the other party.
- 4.5. <u>Further Assurances and Cooperation</u>. In order to carry out and give full effect to this MOU, each party will use all reasonable efforts to provide such information, sign and deliver such further instruments and documents, and take such actions as may be reasonably requested by the other party, so long as not inconsistent with the provisions of this MOU and not involving the assumption of obligations or liabilities different from, in excess of, or in addition to those expressly provided for in this MOU. The parties will reasonably cooperate with each other to carry out the purpose and intent of this MOU, including providing assistance in obtaining approvals and permits from regulatory agencies required to perform the obligations under this MOU.
- 4.6. <u>Amendment</u>. This MOU may be modified or amended only by a later writing approved and signed by all parties.
- 4.7. <u>Governing Law</u>. This MOU will be interpreted, governed by, and construed under the laws of the State of California, without giving effect to any conflict of law principles.
- 4.8. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice, consent, approval, or other communication (collectively "Notice") required or permitted to be given under this MOU shall be in writing and delivered or sent either (a) in person, (b) by prepaid, first-class U.S. mail, (c) by a nationally recognized commercial overnight courier service that guarantees next day delivery and provides a

receipt, or (d) by email with a confirmed receipt. Any Notice so delivered or sent will be deemed given (a) when delivered in person, (b) three days after deposited in prepaid, first-class U.S. mail, (c) on the date of delivery as shown on the overnight courier service receipt, or (d) upon the sender's receipt of an email from the other party confirming the receipt of the emailed Notice. Notices required or permitted to be given under this MOU shall be addressed as follows:

- 4.10. <u>Counterparts</u>. This MOU may be executed in counterparts, which together shall constitute the same and entire MOU.

STANISLAUS COUNTY ENCROACHMENT PERMIT CONDITIONS

The undersigned is hereby applying for a permit to work in the Public right-of-way at the site address as shown on this permit, subject to the provisions required by Streets and Highways Code 1450-1496 and the following permit conditions as noted below:

STANISLAUS COUNTY ENCROACHMENT PERMIT CONDITIONS

- 1. ACCEPTANCE OF THE PROVISIONS: It is understood and agreed by the Permittee that all conditions have been read, and understood. The Permittee agrees to comply with all conditions.
- 2. KEEP PERMIT ON WORK SITE: This permit, or a complete copy, shall be kept at the site of the work and upon request must be shown to any County representative or law enforcement officer.
- 3. PERMITS FROM OTHER AGENCIES: Permittee must obtain all other permits required by other public or private agencies or individuals necessary in order to perform the intended work. It shall be the responsibility of the Permittee to notify the utility and cable TV companies prior to starting any construction that may involve their underground or overhead utilities.
- 4. INSURANCE: Owners, developers or contractors must provide certificates of insurance in an amount of at least \$1,000,000 or as determined by the Department.
- 5. BONDS: A cash deposit, performance bond, letter of credit or other approved form of security shall be submitted in an amount equal to 100% of the value of the work performed within the County right of way or easement.
- 6. INSPECTION NOTIFICATION: The Permittee shall notify the Department of Public Works Encroachment Inspector assigned to this project, shown on page 1, a minimum of two (2) working days prior to performance of any work under this permit. Any work performed without inspection or contrary to Stanislaus County Public Works Standard Construction Specifications, Standard Details or approved plans shall be deemed non-complying and will not be accepted by the County.
- 7. TRAFFIC CONTROL: Construction traffic control shall conform to the current edition of the "California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices", as published by the State of California, Department of Transportation.
- 8. PERMIT EXPIRATION: This permit is valid for a period of six months as measured from the construction start date or until liability insurance expires, whichever comes first, unless otherwise specified on Page one under General Notes.
- 9. UNDERGROUND SERVICE ALERT: Permittee must notify Underground Service Alert (USA) at 800-642-2444 or 1-800-227-2600 at least 48 hours in advance of start of work for location of underground utilities.
- 10. GUARANTEE: For a period of one year after acceptance by the Department of Public Works, the Permittee shall guarantee all work performed under this permit. Any failure caused by defective materials or workmanship shall be promptly repaired or replaced at the Permittee's expense. Failure of the Permittee to make such corrections will cause the County to make or have made any necessary repairs at the Permittee's expense.
- 11. STORAGE OF MATERIAL: Excavated material, sand, gravel, or any construction materials and debris shall not be stockpiled in the County right-of-way.

12 PUBLIC CONVENIENCE:

- (a) The Permittee shall conduct his operations as to offer the least obstruction and inconvenience to the public and abutting property owners. The Permittee shall have under construction no greater amount of work than he can properly secure at the end of the workday with due regard to the safety of the public.
- (b) Unless otherwise provided in the permit, all public traffic shall be permitted to pass through the work with as little inconvenience and delay as possible.
- (c) The Permittee at his expense shall remove spillage resulting from hauling operations along or across any publicly traveled way immediately.
- (d) Convenient access to driveways, houses, and buildings along the work shall be maintained and temporary approaches to crossings or intersecting highways shall be provided and kept in good condition. When the abutting property owner's access across the right-of-way line is to be eliminated, or to be replaced under the permit by other access facilities, the existing access shall not be closed until the replacement access facilities are usable.
- (e) Standard work hours will be 7:00am to 5:00pm, Monday through Friday, Unless pre-approved by County Engineer and listed on page 1 of this permit under General Notes.
- (f) If ordered by the Inspector, water shall be supplied by the Permittee to alleviate or prevent dust nuisance.

13. SAFETY:

- (a) General The Permittee shall be solely and completely responsible for the conditions of the job site, including safety of all persons and property during performance of the work. This requirement shall not be limited to normal working hours. Safety provisions shall conform to all applicable Federal, State, and local laws, ordinances, and codes, and to the rules and regulations established by the California Division of Industrial Safety, and to other rules of law applicable to the work.
- (b) The services of the Inspector in conducting construction review of the Permittee's performance is not intended to include review of the adequacy of the Permittee's work methods, equipment, bracing or scaffolding or safety measures, in, on, or near the construction site, and shall not be construed as supervision of the actual construction nor make the Inspector or the County responsible for providing a safe place for the performance of work by the Permittee, Contractor, subcontractors, or suppliers; or for access, visits, use work, travel or occupancy by any person.
- (c) The Permittee shall instruct all personnel working in potentially hazardous work areas as to potential dangers and shall provide such necessary safety equipment and instruction as is necessary to prevent injury to personnel and damage to property. Special care shall be exercised relative to electrical work, work involving excavation and in sump pump work.
- (d) All work and materials shall be in strict accordance with all applicable State, Federal and local laws, rules, regulations, and codes.
- (e) Nothing in this permit is to be construed to permit work not conforming to governing law.
- (f) Shoring and Trench Safety Plan Attention is directed to Section 832 of the Civil Code of the State of California, Section 6705 of the State Labor Code, and the Construction Safety Orders of the State of California Division of Industrial Safety.

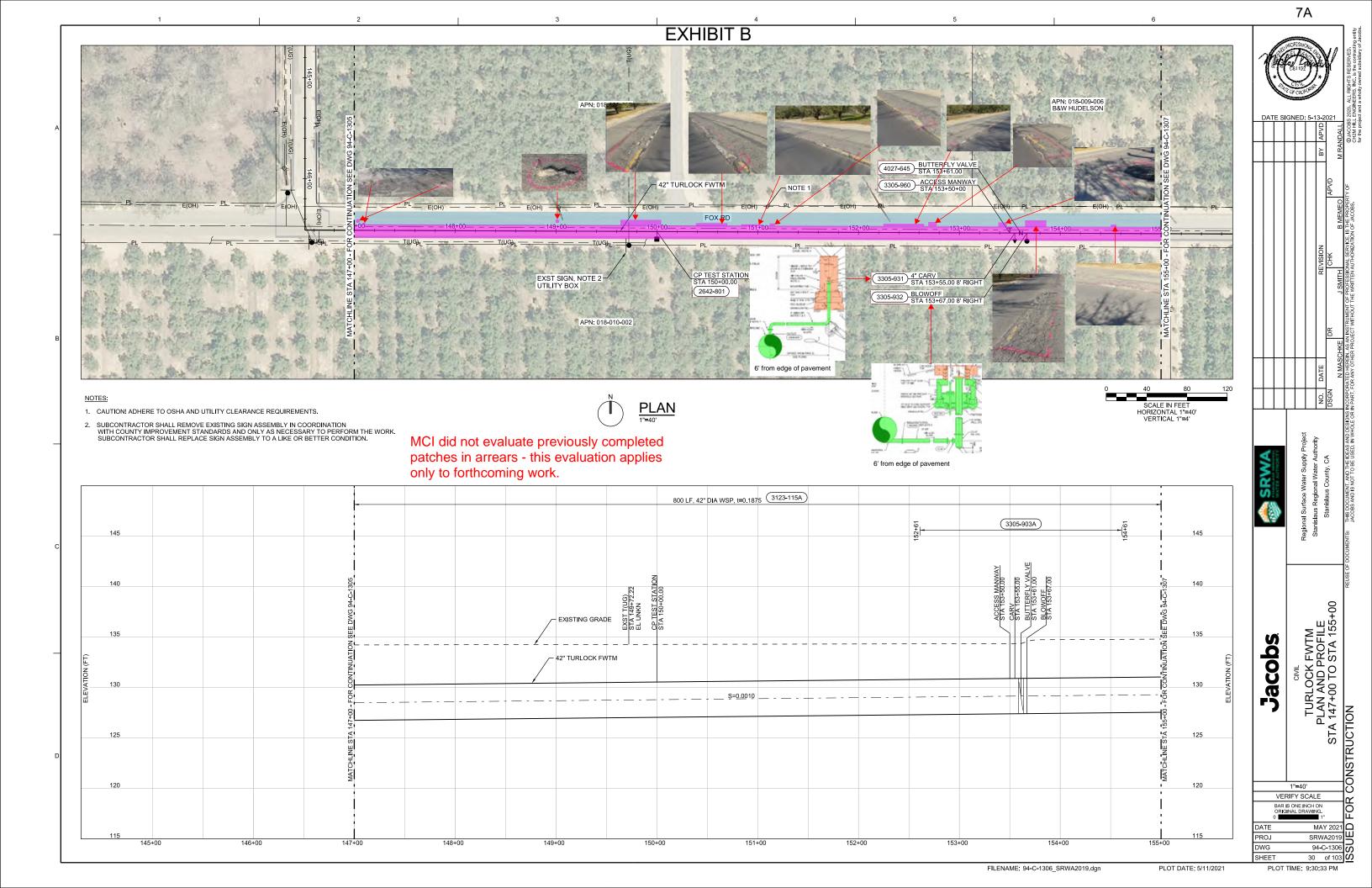
14. PROTECTION OF PERSON AND PROPERTY:

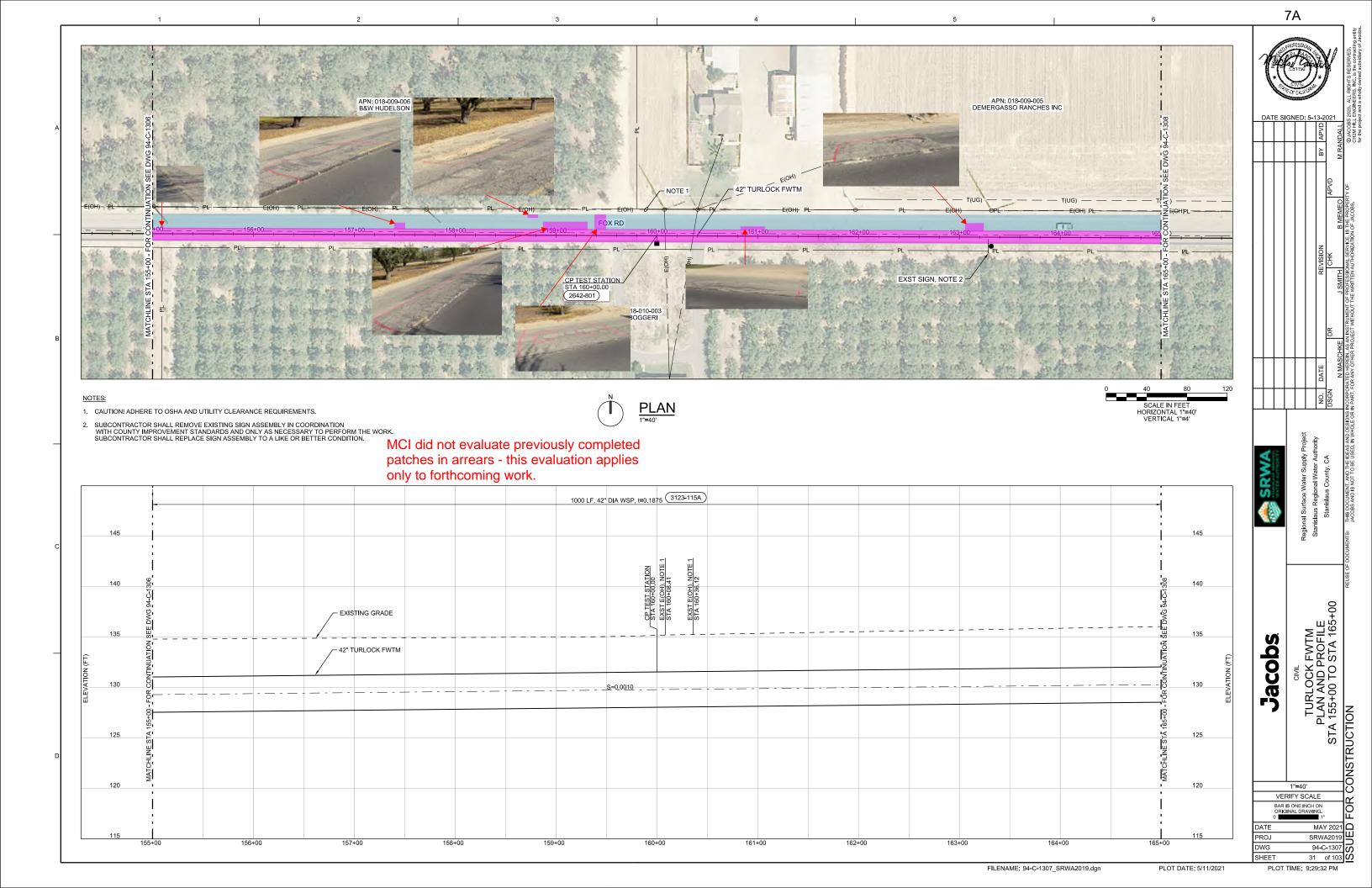
- (a) The Permittee shall take whatever precautions are necessary to prevent damage to all existing improvements, including above ground and underground utilities, trees, shrubbery that is not specifically shown to be removed, fences, signs, mailboxes, survey markers and monuments, buildings, structures, the County's property, adjacent property, and any other improvements or facilities within or adjacent to the work. If such improvements or property are injured or damaged by reason of the Permittee's operations, they shall be replaced or restored, at the Permittee's expense, to a condition at least as good as the condition they were in prior to the start of the Permittee's operations.
- (b) The Permittee shall adopt all practical means to minimize interference to traffic and public inconvenience, discomfort or damage. The Permittee shall protect against injury to any pipes, conduits or other structures crossing the trenching or encountered in the work and shall be responsible for any injury done to such pipes or structures, or damage to property resulting there from. He shall support or replace any such structures without delay.
- (c) The Permittee shall pay the entire expense of replacing the highway in as good condition as before.
- 15. RESPONSIBILITY FOR REPAIR OF FACILITIES: All public or private facilities, including but not limited to, gravel surfacing at existing canals, structures, telephone cables, roadways, curbs, gutters, parking lots, private drives, levees and embankments for creeks, ponds and reservoirs disturbed during construction of the work shall be repaired and/or replaced by the Permittee to match facilities existing prior to construction. In addition, the Permittee shall be responsible for any settlement damage to such facilities or adjoining areas for a period of one year after acceptance of such
- 16. COUNTY'S REPAIR: In the event the Permittee refuses or neglects to make good any loss or damage for which he is responsible under this permit, the County may itself, or by the employment of others, make good any such loss or damage, and the cost and expense of doing so, including any reasonable engineering, legal and other consultant fees, and any costs of administrative and managerial services, shall be charged to the Permittee.
- 17. CONTRACTOR'S LICENSE NOTICE: Contractors are required by law to be licensed and regulated by the Contractor's State License Board. Any questions concerning a contractor may be referred to the registrar, Contractor's State License Board, 9821 Business Park Dr., Sacramento, California or by visiting www.cslb.ca.gov or by calling 1-800-321-CSLB (2752).
- 18. INDEMNITY AND LITIGATION COST:
- (a) The Permittee specifically obligates himself and hereby agrees to protect, hold free and harmless, defend and indemnify the County, the Engineer, his consultants, and each of their officers, employees and agents, from any and all liability, penalties, costs, losses, damages, expenses, causes of action, claims or judgments, including attorney's fees, which arise out of or are in any way connected with the Permittee's, his Contractor's, or his subcontractors' or suppliers' performance of work under this permit. To the extent legally permissible, this indemnity and hold harmless agreement by the Permittee shall apply to any acts or omissions, whether active or passive, on the part of the Permittee or his agents, employees and representatives, resulting in liability irrespective of whether or not any acts or omissions of the parties to be indemnified hereunder may also have been a contributing factor to the liability.
- (b) In any and all claims against the County or the Engineer and his consultants, and each of their officers, employees and agents by any employee of the Permittee, his Contractor, any Subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the indemnification of obligation under this Section shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the Contractor or any Subcontractor under Workmen's Compensation status, disability benefit statures, or other employee benefit statutes.
- 19. MONUMENT PRESERVATION PROTECTION: Contractor is responsible for preservation and/or perpetuation of all existing monuments which control subdivisions, tracts, boundaries, streets, highways, easements, or other right-of-way, easements, or provide survey control which will be disturbed or removed due to contractor's work. Contractor shall provide a minimum of 10 working days notice to project engineer/surveyor prior to disturbance or removal of existing monuments. Project engineer/surveyor shall coordinate with contractor to reset monuments or provide permanent witness monuments and file the required documentation with the County Surveyor pursuant to Business and Professional Code section 8771.

Please refer to Mountain Cascade, Inc's March 28, 2022 proposal, which included an escalator on the unit price for the additional 2" grind and overlay. For every \$5 increase in the California Statewide Crude Oil Price Index above its March 3, 2022 publication (\$507.20), the unit price for the grind and overlay increases \$0.0364 to account for increased material costs, except that the price provided would be valid through the month of April. As of May 4, 2022, the third business day of the month, the price index is now \$596.70, which results in the unit price of \$29.07 per square yard increasing to \$29.73 per square yard.

This is expected to affect the total cost of the aforementioned additional grind and overlay work. A worksheet attached, tabulates the cost of the work completed prior to the increase, and the work remaining to be completed. The current total is anticipated to be \$987,950.65 at completion.dd

- (1) Pavement spoils and recycling asphalt concrete from existing roadbed may be used to construct shoulders per Condition 7 of the draft Encroachment Permit.
- For the areas of Berkeley Road and John Fox Road where the pipeline is located outside of the pavement section, the County will be financially responsible for any improvements or widening of the roadway, based upon funding available, at County's discretion, with enough notice to allow for DB contractor design and construction to include widening. The SRWA's financial responsibility in these areas will only be construction of the 1-foot gravel shoulder and damage caused by the DB contractor as described in footnote 4.
- There are portions of Berkeley Road that are in poor condition. The County will need to determine whether they want to reconstruct the adjacent travel lane in conjunction with road widening. SRWA will be financial responsibility for any damage caused to the adjacent lane by the DB contractor as described in footnote 4.
- Prior to and following construction the Pavement Condition Index of the adjacent roadway will be assessed in accordance with the Encroachment Permit Conditions. The pre- and post-conditions will determine what surface treatments are the responsibility of SRWA. If the post-PCI does not identify SRWA responsibility for surface treatments to the adjacent travel lane then the County will maintain full financial responsibility for the subject overlay based on funding available, at County's discretion, with enough notice to allow for DB contractor construction to include grind and overlay.

The South San Joaquin Irrigation District (SSJID) is pleased to submit this letter in response to your March 8, 2022 Request for Letters of Expression of Interest for the Stanislaus Regional Water Authority (SRWA) Regional Surface Water Supply Project (RSWSP). We appreciate the opportunity to explore the possibility of collaborating with SRWA on its water treatment plant startup and future operation. SSJID is very interested in engaging with SRWA on this project, and believes that SSJID's relevant experience in the provision and delivery of high quality drinking water for local cities could be beneficial to the SRWA and its member communities.

BACKGROUND

SSJID is a California irrigation district, governed by the provisions of Division 11 of the California Water Code. The SSJID main office is located at 11011 East Highway 120, Manteca, CA, which is approximately 28 miles from the SRWA RSWSP. SSJID is governed by a five-member, elected board of directors. We currently have approximately 100 employees supporting our irrigation and drinking water operations. Our employees are represented by two different labor organizations: operations and field staff are represented by IBEW Local 1245; and administrative, technical, and management employees are represented by an internal SSJID Management Bargaining Unit.

SSJID was formed in 1909 to secure water rights; design, finance, and construct water distribution facilities; and deliver irrigation water to approximately 72,000 acres in and around Escalon, Manteca and Ripon. In 1916, SSJID constructed Woodward Reservoir near Oakdale in Stanislaus County, to provide additional surface water storage and flexibility for water deliveries. In 1926, SSJID partnered with Oakdale Irrigation District (OID) to construct the original Melones Reservoir. In 1948, SSJID and OID collaborated again to form the Tri-Dam Project, to increase the districts' water storage abilities and to produce hydropower through a system of dams and

reservoirs on the Stanislaus River. The resulting Tri-Dam Project, completed in 1957, provides 230,000-acre feet of water storage and 102 megawatts of hydropower generation capability.

SSJID partnered with the Cities of Manteca, Escalon, Lathrop and Tracy in the 1990s to form the South County Water Supply Project (SCWSP). The SCWSP promotes collaboration in regional water resources and water supply diversification for local cities by providing them treated surface water supplies. The SCWSP culminated in the construction and commissioning of the Nick C. DeGroot Water Treatment Plant (WTP) and related transmission facilities in 2005. At construction, the plant was the second largest membrane filtration drinking water plant in the nation, providing the partner-cities with up to 40 million gallons of drinking water per day.

In 2021, SSJID was awarded a Transparency Certificate of Excellence by the Special District Leadership Foundation. SSJID's board and team members are committed to upholding values of transparency, accountability, and good governance in the delivery of vital resources to its customers and stakeholders.

SSJID WATER TREATMENT EXPERIENCE

SSJID provides raw water supply to the WTP through Woodward Reservoir, treats the water, and distributes it to the SCWSP partner-cities. The plant is a Department of Drinking Water (DDW) T5/D4 system located at 5855 Dodds Road in Oakdale, CA, and is 19 miles north of the SRWA facility.

The WTP utilizes differential elevations and gravity-flow to supply raw water from Woodward Reservoir to its headworks. Upon delivery, the raw water is injected with an aluminum chlorohydrate (ACH) flocculent and a sodium hypochlorite (hypo) disinfectant, before flowing through static mixing chambers designed to maximize pin-floc formation by gently bringing together colloidal solids, which are naturally occurring in the raw water and the flocculent. Gravity then moves the water and pin-floc flow into a series of dissolved air floatation (DAF) basins, where dissolved air creates micro-bubbles, lifting the pin-floc in the water column to create a floating mat of floc particles. The pre-treatment water then flows from the DAF basin to the stabilization basin, where lime slurry from an RDP-Tekkem system and CO₂ are added and mixed. This raises the alkalinity of the water, which helps prevent corrosion in the 36-miles of concrete lined transmission pipeline that SSJID uses to deliver water to the customer cities. From the stabilization basin, the water continues to flow via gravity into eight membrane filter basins. The plant uses submerged, Suez/Zenon ZW-1000 membrane filters, ultra-filtration membrane filters that remove particles as small as 0.002 microns. From the membrane filters, the water is injected with a final dose of hypo disinfectant and pumped into two, three million gallon treated water storage tanks, which gravity feed water to the transmission line. There are seven separate turnout facilities along this

transmission line consisting of storage tanks, booster pumps, flow control valves and meters, which provide the terminal connection to each customer-city's water distribution system.

SSJID assumes responsibility for all operations and maintenance, and capital program elements of the plant and transmission system. In order to support operations, the SSJID WTP is staffed with 20 employees as shown in Table 1. Eight (8) of SSJID's WTP staff were hired before or within a year of the plant commissioning in 2005, and have experience with treatment and transmission facility startup.

SSJID's Manteca office provides support to the Nick DeGroot Water Treatment Plant for various business functions ranging from management, accounting and finance, human resources, and administration. These services are allocated to SSJID WTP customers based on either a time and materials basis, or through fixed allocations for specific staff. The following is a comprehensive list of these support functions:

SSJID bills the cities monthly for all fixed and variable costs of the treatment and transmission operations, including capital projects contributions. Fixed costs and capital contributions are allocated to each city based on each city's share of water supply; variable costs are billed based on actual water delivered to each city. The average cost for treated water delivered in 2021 to the cities was approximately \$320 per acre-foot.

SSJID WTP operations fall under the purview of its Board of Directors. However, the plant operations are also reviewed by an Operating Committee consisting of SSJID staff and representation from each partner-city. The Operating Committee meets quarterly to review operational and financial performance of the SSJID WTP facilities, review annual budgets, and coordinate on capital projects such as future plant expansion and upgrades.

SSJID INTEREST IN PARTNERING WITH SRWA

After reviewing SRWA's proposed staffing plans and March 8 request letter, SSJID wishes to express its interest in the opportunity to assist with staffing and operating the Regional Surface Water Supply Project water treatment plant for SRWA. We believe that SSJID's experience with water treatment plant and transmission operations, and working relationships with municipal-level customers, are particularly well suited with SRWA's proposed facilities and staffing model, and that a regional partnership between SSJID and SRWA member cities could provide shared economic and operational benefits for all involved parties, including:

- Cost-effective operations, and assurances that SRWA assets maintained for long-term reliability through transparent and accountable public agency plant administration
- Optimization of SRWA staffing by utilizing existing SSJID plant expertise and administrative functions
- Increased workforce of certified drinking water operators in the region, promoting stability and reliability for SRWA and SSJID plant operations
- Savings through economies of scale in material and chemical purchases

SSJID is capable of providing operations and administrative support as it currently does with its own water treatment plant. SSJID's operators and managers with startup experience could assist SRWA with initial plant startup, and other SSJID functions could be used to support administrative, equipment, and accounting needs of the plant. There are several possible variations of our current operational model that could meet SRWA's

operational needs. SSJID would like to engage with SRWA to further discuss SRWA's anticipated near-term and

possible longer-term operational and staffing needs to determine what level of assistance SRWA might request,

and what SSJID might be able to provide.

SSJID is also interested in exploring mutual aid relationships with SRWA to promote regional reliability and

support for emergency water treatment operations. SSJID is currently part of the California Water/Wastewater

Agency Response Network (CalWARN), but a more local network of mutual aid agencies would increase

responsiveness in the event of an emergency.

SSJID thanks the SRWA for the opportunity to further explore supporting this important regional water supply

project for the Cities of Turlock and Ceres. We look forward to engaging with the SRWA in more detail to

understand SRWA's vision and plans for its member cities, and to determine what resources SSJID can provide

in support.
